

Cast Your Bread Upon the Waters Gary Henry

"Cast your bread upon the waters, For you will find it after many days." Ecclesiastes 11:1

Tomorrow is uncertain, but that should not stop us from doing what we can do today. Our judgment of what we should do may not be the best sometimes, and even when our plans are well laid, unforeseen events may alter their outcome. Nevertheless, we must do the best that we know to do today.

Ecclesiastes 11:1 is one of those verses whose main point is fairly obvious in context, but interpreters differ as to the specific illustration or metaphor the writer had in mind. I personally think the image is that of a merchant sending his goods out on a ship, which in ancient times was a very risky thing to do. Risky or not, however, the merchant wouldn't make any money if he simply did nothing and kept his goods at home. The NEB translates it: "Send your grain across the seas; and in time you will get a return."

When we are contemplating what is the best course of action to follow, we should certainly exercise PRUDENCE. We should be careful and use the very best judgment of which we are capable.

But having been careful in our planning, we then need to exercise ENERGY and IN-DUSTRY in carrying out our plan. However hesitant we may have been in making our plan, once the plan is made we need to put our whole heart into its implementation. I well remember my youngest son's golf coach advising him on a very difficult hole where it was going to be hard to select the right club. Having helped him weigh the pros and cons, he then said, "It's your decision, Grant. But whichever club you choose, COMMIT to it." In life, as in golf, we often "swing" hesitantly, as if we're not sure we selected the right "club." And when we swing hesitantly, not even the right club is going to help us do very much.

In the end, our confidence must be in GOD, and not our own wisdom or ability. Having been as prudent as we know how to be and then acting as energetically as we can, we must trust that God will take our actions today and bring about a good return tomorrow.

"Nevertheless I have this against you, that you have left your first love"

Revelation 2:4

It is good for us to recall the ardent love that we had when our great desire for God was newly discovered. As time goes by, the demands and difficulties of earthly existence keep us busy and wear us out. If we don't frequently tend the fire of our love for God, it will die down. It is not impossible for the flame to flicker and go out altogether. Our "first love" for God is a fire that must be kept burning and if necessary be rekindled.

Jesus Christ sent this message to the church in Ephesus: "Nevertheless I have this against you, that you have left your first love." These were hardworking Christians who had made considerable sacrifices to maintain the integrity of the gospel. Yet so much time had passed since their conversion, they seemed not to remember the way they had loved the Lord at first. But the Lord remembered. And His words of warning to them recall the words that God spoke through Jeremiah to the people of Jerusalem: "I remember you, the kindness of your youth, the love of your betrothal, when you went after Me in the wilderness, in a land not sown" (Jeremiah 2:2). It is not a good thing to let slip from our memory something that God still remembers about us!

To those in Ephesus who had left their first love, Christ said, "Remember therefore from where you have fallen; repent and do the first works, or else I will come to you quickly and remove your lampstand from its place — unless you repent" (Revelation 2:5). The "remember" and "repent" should tell us that the love which the Lord desires from us is more than an illusive emotion. Ultimately, it is a love that springs from the will. And if we don't love Him as we used to, there are specific things we can do to rectify that problem. One of these would be to take some time off, go to a restful place, and remember — really REMEMBER — how we used to love God. This memory will be a refreshing, nourishing. energizing reflection on what once was and on what can still be.

"O God, the God of all goodness and of all grace, who art worthy of a greater love than we can either give or understand: Fill our hearts, we beseech you, with such love toward you that nothing may seem too hard for us to do or to suffer in obedience to your will; and grant that thus loving you, we may become daily more like you, and finally obtain the crown of life which thou hast promised to those that love you; through Jesus Christ our Lord"—Brooke Foss Westcott

"For I am not ashamed of the gospel of Christ, for it is the power of God to salvation for everyone who believes, for the Jew first and also for the Greek." — Romans 1:16

The gospel is not "a" power (as though it is one among many), but is "the" power (the one and only power) by which God moves men to salvation. The word "power" in Romans 1:16 is from the Greek word "dunamis" from which we get our words "dynamo," "dynamic," and "dynamite." Like dynamite, the gospel is God's power to blast men out of their complacency and indifference, and move them toward eternal salvation. The Hebrew writer said:

"For the word of God is living and active and sharper than any two-edged sword, and piercing as far as the division of soul and spirit, of both joints and marrow, and able to judge the thoughts and intentions of the heart." —Hebrews 4:12
